# Samsara is Nirvana

"When foolish beings of delusion and defilement awaken shinjin, They realize that birth-and-death is itself nirvana; Without fail they reach the land of immeasurable light And universally guide sentient beings to enlightenment." CWS p72

This verse is from Shoshinge composed by Shinran and included in his major work, Kyogyoshinsho.

I've thought about and talked about this verse many times in the past few years. I've been reluctant to write about it because committing these thoughts to paper feels far more permanent than I feel comfortable with. My understanding may be deficient. Someone referring to it may end up with my misunderstanding. However, whatever the effects, here are my thoughts.

In the 70's one of the Suzukis, either D.T. Suzuki or the lesser know Shunryo Suzuki, stated "this dirty earth is Pureland" which seemed profound. How is this place that Buddhism seems to point us away from being the very place at which we are to arrived. During Ohigan we hear about moving from this shore to the other shore. Shinran often uses the image of Amida's Vow as the ship that carries us to the Pure Land. There are many examples of moving from here to there, from this shore to the other shore. This is the primary structure that influenced my understanding of what the Buddhadharma is trying to get me to experience as an unenlightened being seeking release. I have to move from unenlightenment to enlightenment. I am carried from this shore of birth-and-death to Pure Land. There is movement from one place to another. That basic structure of movement seems absent in Suzuki's statement and the second line of Shinran's verse.

When I first began thinking about Shinran's verse it was the second line that drew my attention. The first line is often the focus because it references shinjin which is essential in Shinshu thought. However, regardless if I awaken shinjin or not the second line seems to stand on its own: birth-and-death is itself nirvana. If I awaken shinjin birth-and-death is nirvana. If I do not awaken shinjin birth-and-death is still nirvana. How can nirvana and birth-and-death be both the same and not the same unless it is related to how it is perceived, how I perceive it.

Jodo Shinshu is Buddhadharma. It has at its core, like all schools of Buddhism, the Four Noble Truths. This is the first thing Shakyamuni shared after his enlightenment:

Dukkha: we cause and experience difficulties

Tanha: dukkha results from our tendency to see the world through what I like and don't like.

Nirvana: we do not need to continue to cause and experience difficulties Eightfold Path: the means to cultivate the mind that is free of preferences

The intent of the Buddha is to help us realize the cause of difficulties and resolve those difficulties. The resolution of difficulties is the mind that sees things as they are; a mind free of prejudice. How I perceive nirvana causes my experience of nirvana to be as birth-and-death. To see the world and engage the world through my preferences, my likes and dislikes, I split the world offering opportunities for difficulties to arise. I am right, you are wrong. I am Buddhist, you are not. I am a Democrat you are Republican. The Eightfold Path leads to the softening of boundaries that separate. Easing the tensions that result from my preferences. It is

not that we become dispassionate or uncaring. We realize that what separates us, we have created. To cultivate the mind that sees things as they are is to begin to see my own prejudices and preferences.

I experience nirvana as birth-and-death because of my preferences. As I am able to acknowledge this I can begin the cultivate the mind free of prejudice. Free of anger, greed ignorance. Cultivating the mind free from prejudice is to cultivate the mind that sees things as they are. Practicing the Eightfold Path is the means to resolve the difficulties we cause and experience. It is the practice that leads to enlightenment.

In Jodo Shinshu I realize the impossibility for me to cultivate, through the practices represented by the Eightfold Path, the mind that sees things as they are. However, Amida's Vow assures me of the eventual resolution of difficulties. That assurance allows me to look more openly at my prejudices and begin to see things as they are.

The world has not changed. I am changed. Nirvana is still Nirvana.

# Why we should not harm others

There are unfortunately many movements around the world that discriminate against people because of their race, gender, abilities, or because they are different from others, and promote slander and violence against them. When considering this issue, it is important for us to think about why we should not harm others in the first place.

Buddhism actually gives us a clear answer to this question.

According to a Buddhist scripture called *Saṃyutta Nikāya*, Sakyamuni Buddha states " **Though in thought we** range throughout the world, We'll nowhere find a thing more dear than self. So, since others hold the self so dear, One who loves oneself should injure none."

There are many things in this world that are important to us, such as family, friends, and pets. Ultimately, however, there might be no being more beloved or more important to us than ourselves. This is true for everyone, that is, it is the same for someone else, and everyone loves and is important to oneself. Sakyamuni Buddha shows us in very simple words through this sutra; if you think you are important, you must also respect the thoughts of others who feel the same way. So you must not harm others."

What these words teach us is that it doesn't matter whether you are rich or not, whether you work hard or not, whether you have superior abilities or not, what color your skin is, your birth, your gender, your occupation, or the situation you are currently in, or any of those things. He is simply saying that if you are the most important (and to achieve this), you should also respect the thoughts and lives of others.

The society we live in is very complex, with many different values, and each person values different things. Therefore, it is natural that there will be times when people will "fit in" or "not fit in" with each other's values, and there may be times when people will have to decide what is "necessary" or "unnecessary" for them. It would be nice if we could get along with all people, but that is not easy. Even if a person does not agree with you, even if you feel that he/she is not necessary or irrelevant to you, it is still a dangerous way of thinking to selfishly assign a superiority or inferiority to a person's life or existence, and to think that you can eliminate those you judge to be of no value to you.

This is what I need to do, to question myself, because I always live my life making selfish value judgments.

We live in a complex society with various values. That is why we should return once again to the simple and universal point that Buddhism shows us, to understand why we should not harm others, and to live in a world where we can make the most of each other's lives.

# Dharma Center Fundraising Kicks Off with a \$2 Millon Matching Pledge

The push to build a replacement for the Betsuin's aging Education Building has received a big boost: a \$2 million matching pledge supported by the Takeo and Miyoko Yuki family.

All donations through the end of the year to the Dharma Center project will be matched dollar-fordollar up to a total of \$2 million, meaning potentially \$4 million could be contributed to the project.

The pledge comes as the Betsuin on Oct. 1 officially launched the "Generations. Our Legacy" fundraising campaign, which will ensure the future of Lotus Preschool and other organizations that support the Betsuin, the Sangha and Community.

Construction on the nearly 12,000-square-foot project – estimated to cost about \$15 million – could begin late next year and be finished in 2024.

"We are very excited by our plans for the new Dharma Center," said Steve Onishi, the Betsuin president. "This will replace our aging Education Building with a new, state of the art facility that will greatly enhance the beauty, and functionality of our campus."

"Much as the Issei and Nisei had to sacrifice to build our current facilities, we hope that you will join us to help bring our facilities into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. While our goal is to raise \$15 million, we have already received commitments for nearly half of that amount from some very generous Sangha members.

"To help us in those efforts, an extremely generous Sangha member has offered to match all donations, up to a maximum of \$2 million to help us reach our goals! So, I hope that everyone can help us to reach that goal."

Even before the matching pledge, nearly \$6 million has been raised for the project. The matching effort could increase that total to two-thirds of the overall projected cost.

Planning is under way for multiple fundraisers in 2023 sponsored by the Betsuin, individual temple organizations and our local community, in addition to asking each member of the Sangha to consider giving to the project.

The six-decade old Education Building has served the Betsuin well, but it is antiquated, lacks modern security and high tech features, is not ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant and does not meet current seismic safety codes. Plans for its replacement have been in the works for the past 15 years. The Dharma Center is the second of a two-phase capital building

project the Betsuin began with the renovation and seismic-safety improvements to the Annex Building completed in 2016.

The two-story Dharma Center will be nearly twice as large as the Education Building it will replace, have a space tailored to fit the needs of Lotus Preschool and facilities for other organizations and groups, including larger classrooms, a conference room, multi-purpose room with kitchen and a parking lot with at least 60 spaces.

The center will also feature five classrooms, a library with room for research and educational uses; media/conference room for meetings of up to 52 people, community events, film showings and private parties; a large multi-purpose room that can accommodate 120 seated at tables, 257 on chairs and 360 standing; and a full kitchen.

The \$15 million cost estimate will make the Dharma Center one of the largest construction projects in the history of Shin Buddhism in the United States.

"It's a lot of money," said temple member Adam Sweeney, who in his tech career was involved in office building projects and has generously volunteered his time and expertise to make the Dharma Center a reality.

"We have people here at church that have wanted this to happen for many years, and they encouraged us to stretch a bit on the budget to make sure that we build something we'll be proud of."

The Betsuin is fortunate to have members who can make six-figure and even seven-figure donations, according to Sweeney.

"We also have younger church members like me who have worked in and benefited from the tech industry

over the last 20 years," Sweeney said. "Many of us have done well with the growth of our companies and the stock market. I'm hoping that we can all step up to share some of the results of all that to pay for another big chunk of our \$15 million target."

"Finally, we'll do this the way we always have.
Fundraising dinners, events, bake sales, and every other way that our creative and hard working Sangha members can come up with. I expect that this will take time, effort, and money from all of us, but the results are going to be beautiful and long lasting."

If smaller installments are more comfortable for you, you may also pledge a specified amount but spread the payments over 6 months through the end of March 2023. # EcoSangha EcoTip: Recycling Cooking Water

This EcoTip is a hassle free, environmentally friendly & sustainable idea. It's recycling cooking water that normally goes down the kitchen drain. Think cost-effective, being resourceful & "cooking up conservation".

When you boil your pasta (in unsalted water), vegetables, eggs or potatoes, many of the micronutrients such as phosphorus, nitrogen & calcium are boiled off into the water. After letting the cooking water cool, you can provide your garden plants with a nice drink & they will get much needed fertilizer from the nutrients.

You might consider doing the same with the multiple rinses when washing rice. Save that water for your plants. This idea was shared by Robin Shinagawa. Dave Pascual also saves pasta water to water his plants. You'll think of other ways to save & recycle reusable water too!
