In Conversation

A merchant once prepared a luxurious meal for a gathering of priests. He wanted to express his gratitude for all their work. Although he was not a very devout person he recognized and appreciated how much these teachers had done for the community. No effort was spared in the planning and preparation of the meal. The highest quality ingredients. The best meats and produce. Fish and fowl were brought in from markets and forests near and far. No detail went unexamined. Checked and rechecked. When the evening came, guests began to arrive.

The priests were invited to take their seat at the table. Their host joined them and welcomed them all. Then the food began to arrive. Each setting was beautifully arranged. Attention to portion, placement and shape. Each sense awakened. The mind too was caused to be moved, for before the priests were placed meats and flesh of once living beings. There was an audible pause then the priests removed their kesa and began to dine. All but one, who continued to wear his kesa as he enjoyed his meal.

Throughout the evening servers busied themselves bringing food and removing trays. One young server paused next to priest who wore his kesa and asked why he did not remove his kesa when everyone else did. The priest replied that whether he wore his kesa or not he was still just a foolish person.

I don't think he was commenting on the behavior of the other priests. I believe his choice, his decision to continue to wear his kesa was simply an acknowledgement of who he was. That authenticity and genuineness is sometimes hard to express. Sometimes we express who we are through how others might see us. Our roles and identification are readily recognized. As a priest I might behave in ways that are expected. Not that the behavior is false but rather it may be only a part of what is experienced. An example of this might be a discussion that becomes difficult may require behavior that is different with family and with friends. The circumstances may require behavior that is appropriate in one instance but unacceptable in another. Even if we may want to do or say something we restrain ourselves out of consideration of others. It would be nice to leave our kesa on expressing our own authenticity. But that in itself may be simply responding to expectations of ourself.

With the new year approaching hopefully there will be opportunities to gather together with family and friends, perhaps for the first time in years. A lot to catch up on. Who went away to school. Who was born. Who died. Who moved away. Who we are is the sum and more of all these circumstances. Being authentic and genuine is complicated. Sometimes our enthusiasm for authenticity can be just rude behavior. Sometimes, born out of necessity, we are caused to be authentic, real. When we find ourselves in those circumstances, it takes some time to recognize and acknowledge the infinite causes and conditions that converge in that moment that make our lives possible. In the simple conversation between a server and a priest or in the complex interactions of family and friends if we are mindful we may discover something new that is authentic and genuine.

A Map for your Life

We are all good at finding goals and rewards for the things in front of us, but we are not always so good at where we are going. When it comes to our lives, we're not so sure. We may stop thinking about where our lives are headed because we can't quite wrap our heads around it.

Hearing the Dharma is something like seeing the map in our lives.

My sensei in Japan told me that we hear Dharma to know where we are and where our lives are going. Not hearing either one but hearing **both** where we are and where we are going matters!

How does Buddha Dharma tell us about where we are? We are living as human beings here. Yes, you are one of the human beings. You are here and your family, friends and teachers are here in this world.

We are living with many people in this world, although we haven't met all of them. Even if we live together, we live separately and we sort out people and things around us like you and me, friend or stranger, good or bad, healthy or unhealthy, life or death and stuff like that.

If we find something or someone we like, we might get stuck and stay there. On the other hand, if something or someone is against our preference, we might get mad and try to keep away from it.

Buddhism always tells us where we are. We are always being driven by what we think is good and going this way and that way, and on the other hand, we are angry at what we don't like and try to avoid it, walking blindly in our own convenience without checking where we really are. But you see, even if you lose track of where you are because of our selfish way of living life, Amida is the one who tells us without giving up that the path of life that we are truly living is this way. The destination is the land of the Buddha. When we sit at Hondo, we face toward the Naijin. The Naijin represents the world of Buddha, which means our lives are going forward to enlightenment and being guided by Buddha to the world of true harmony. That is the destination of our lives. We hear that we are nurtured by Buddha to be able to appreciate this world in a true meaning through the Buddha Dharma.

Amida is guiding us to live toward the world of enlightenment where we can see each individual's life as it is, shining brightly without any judgment for our own reasons, without hurting others, and without being ostracized by others.

The truth that reaches to my mouth saying Namu Amida Butsu means that the Buddha of that enlightened world is navigating me now. In the resonance of Namo Amida Butsu, it shows us "You're here" with Amida telling us where we are and embracing each and every one with its compassion and guiding us here to the path of the Buddha.

President's Message

I used to worry about getting old. But now that I am getting there (or already am there according to my sons), I realize that there are definite benefits! For one thing....time seems to fly by! It seems like my term as President just started a few months ago. Actually, it started 2 years ago and my term ends at the end of this month. Of course, maybe it doesn't actually fly by....I just forget more and more! So says the guy that can't remember what he had for breakfast!

When I force myself to think back to the start of my term, it was a crazy time at the beginning of 2021. We were in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic. All of the Betsuin facilities and programs were shutdown. We began transitioning to virtual meetings. The Board of Directors, our ministers and the office staff continued with the business of the church. When things began looking up, we made the decision to have a partial in-person Obon after a year's absence in 2020. We had the "Sangha Summer" on Saturday with pre-ordered take-out meals plus some limited in-person entertainment. Then "Obon at Home Mo Ichido", the virtual portion of Obon was held on Sunday. Sunday services continued throughout the year and were viewable on our YouTube channel.

2022 saw a gradual re-opening of our facilities. In the Spring, the decision was made to go for a "full" Obon. While we were missing a few of our normal booths, most came back and we had a very successful 2-day event. Full re-opening of all facilities occurred in September with Dharma School, Japanese Language School, all youth organizations meeting again. Throughout the pandemic, Lotus Preschool managed to continue to meet virtually at first, and then in-person with reduced numbers and very comprehensive COVID protocols.

We have continued to work on the Generations Phase II program. This new building which will replace our aging Education Building will be called the Dharma Center. Together with our beautiful Hondo called the Buddha Center and the upgraded gym/annex called the Sangha Center, this new Dharma Center will complete our campus that will be an important part of Japantown. This is the opportunity for our generation to leave a legacy for the future of our temple. Fundraising has begun and we have raised over half of the total \$15 million cost estimate. We hope that you will consider supporting us in your year-end charity and tax plans. In addition, we hope that you will take advantage of our improved online membership payment options including PayPal or credit card, and either one-time or installment payments, all available on our church website; sjbetsuin.org.

By anyone's definition, my two-year term as President has been unique. We appear to have "weathered the storm" of this historic pandemic era. It is very gratifying to me personally to see the return of our Sangha once again. I would like to thank the many people that have supported and worked with me these last two years, especially Rinban Sakamoto and Mikame Sensei, the entire office staff, the Board of Directors, the Komon and many others...too many to name. We are all fortunate to be a part of such a vibrant Sangha.

At the end of World War II, after Japanese-Americans were released from the incarceration camps, my family had nowhere to live. There was strong anti-Japanese sentiment in our hometown of Salinas so we decided to try San Jose. The San Jose Buddhist church offered us housing and food. The men slept in the main Hondo, moving the pews every night, while the women slept in another building (which no longer exists). My parents, brothers and sisters and I lived at the temple for approximately two months before finding our own housing. I am forever grateful to the temple for giving me and my family the opportunity to get our lives restarted. **Sus Ikeda**

I'm sure my friend Richard Tanaka, the original architect of the Education Building, would be very happy about this project. It ensures his vision for the church community will continue on for generations to come. **Robert Okamoto**

My husband and I are not from the San Jose area and do not have a lot of family nearby. We were lucky to have all of our kids go through Lotus Preschool which then led to their participation in Scouts through Pack/Troop 611, Girl Scouts, Dharma School and affiliate organizations like CYS and Yu-Ai Kai. We have grown to discover friendships and experiences we would have not had otherwise. 

Is Dental Floss Bad for the Environment?

Yes, traditional dental floss is bad for the environment because it is made from non-recyclable and non-biodegradable materials that contribute to harmful plastic waste in landfills and the ocean. As well as widespread environmental degradation, this causes serious health problems or death for marine life. This is also the case for the plastic containers that traditional dental floss comes in.

The good news is that there are some great, sustainable alternatives to dental floss that help you to maintain the health of your teeth *and* the planet.

1. CORN FLOSS

Made from corn starch bioplastic, candelilla wax and natural mint flavor, corn starch <u>refillable dental floss</u> is a great, plastic-free alternative to traditional floss. Corn dental floss is used the same way that you use traditional floss and is as effective for your teeth and gums.

2.BAMBOO FLOSS

<u>Bamboo is a natural and renewable material</u> — This makes it another great sustainable alternative to remove food, particles, and plaque from between your teeth. Bamboo also has natural antimicrobial properties that make it safer than traditional floss, which sometimes contains harmful microplastics and other toxic chemicals.

3. PLASTIC-FREE PICKS

Prefer a dental pick? Forget non-recyclable plastic picks and opt for a biodegradable one instead. Although these tend to still be single use, the materials will biodegrade faster, and therefore not contribute to plastic pollution.

4. WATER FLOSSERS

A water flosser is a reusable pick with a powerful jet stream that cleans between your teeth. Although not as low-waste as our other options, the reusable head and rechargeable batteries mean there is no single-use waste after each use — and it will last you much longer than traditional floss.
